Honk if you love peace and quiet

I was at the checkout in a large grocery store last week. A message came up on the cashier's computer screen, welcoming me to the store, giving me her name, and assuring me of good service. This apparently relieved the checkout person of the need to acknowledge me at all, since she did not do so. I guess she was too busy, and under pressure to get through all the waiting customers.

What a hectic and busy world this is, when we don't have enough time to engage with each other. We're always on the go! You should have seen me diving into the car park earlier, anxious not to miss out on a spot during this shopping trip. In our work-oriented society, we can all succumb to the pressures of the 'busyness' that surrounds us. We hunger for a deeper, richer life, but this world and its burdens can overwhelm us, if we aren't careful. In today's gospel, Jesus reminds us of a great spiritual truth: It's important for us to be able to lay down our burdens, and experience rest for our souls. Out of all the possible rewards He could promise us, He singles out the notion of rest. Why? Because it is fundamental to our growth in the spiritual life. Without some "Sabbath time" in our lives, we'd never stop long enough to be quiet within, and so, to experience the loving Divine Presence. 'Be still and know that I am God' the psalmist reminds us. It's so easy to become addicted to speed, to getting things done. We need to step aside once in a while, to give ourselves a breather so that we can see more clearly, and be reminded of what life is really about. It might just be a reflective cup of tea, or a peaceful stroll in the fresh air, but some silent moments each day will help keep us in touch with what is real. Learning to slow down and take regular quiet time with God is necessary if we are to be able to explore the Love that is at the very heart of our lives. St Mary of the Cross urges us to 'Believe the whisperings of God in your own heart'. That means learning to be quiet, and to listen. We need to make room for that contemplative space somewhere in our schedule. Otherwise, our daily routines can swamp us. Today's gospel shows us that Jesus understands our spiritual hunger, inviting us to come to Him with our weariness and heavy burdens. Perhaps at times we're like the checkout cashier, too busy to engage with Him because of the pressures upon us. We're totally caught up in the daily treadmill. But if we can stop for long enough to hear His invitation, and to experience the rest that He offers, then our burdens, He promises, will become light. With Sabbath time we learn again to open up and be made new.

NATIONAL ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER SUNDAY

This weekend 3rd July 2011 is National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday with the theme: "Justice and Peace for all". This provides the opportunity for the Catholic community in Australia to reflect on the needs and aspirations of the indigenous peoples of this land. All Catholics will be aware the current plight of many indigenous people, particularly (but not exclusively) in remote locations in Western Australia and the Northern Territory. Finding solutions to these problems and responding appropriately is not easy and requires good will and the capacity to listen before acting. As Catholic Christians we have a long tradition of spending time in prayer and meditation waiting in the silence for God to speak. "Wait for the LORD; be strong and take heart and wait for the LORD" (Psalm 27,14).

THOUGHTS ON THE GOSPEL

Gathering his disciples around him, Jesus encouraged them by sharing with them, in prayer, the joy he found in the relationship with his Father that was his very life. He teaches them the great truths they must announce to the world – the mystery of his relationship with his Father, the strength he found in that relationship, how he made his whole life an expression of the ways of the Father.

In the remarkable moment of prayer remembered in this gospel, Jesus is filled with joy and gratitude that the Father gives a privileged place to the 'little ones' who have been the first concern of his ministry.

As the disciples share in his prayer, he helps them to 'know' the Father. In the language of the Scriptures, let us recall this word means far more than gathering information. It implies a sharing of life that brings the joys and security of true friendship.

As they recalled that he taught them to begin their prayer, 'Our Father', memories of the prayer he had shared with them must have given a greater depth to their personal prayer.'
