The Age-Old Question

The lawyer said to Jesus: "Who is my neighbour"? Jesus replied, "One night a man was walking down an inner Sydney street on his way to the station. He passed a side street and suddenly three young thugs jumped him and began bashing him. He fell to the ground and they kicked him repeatedly. Then they went through his pockets, took his wallet and his wristwatch and ran off laughing. The man lay still with blood pouring from his mouth and nose.

"A priest drove by on his way to a wedding rehearsal. He slowed down but realized that if he stopped, he would keep the wedding party waiting for him, perhaps for a couple of hours. So he drove on. Two minutes later, a couple drove by on their way to the parish Confirmation celebration. "Better not get mixed up in it," said the husband. "The police will handle it. They're used to drunks and fights." So on they drove to the Confirmation celebration.

"A third car came down the street and pulled up near the victim. A bearded Muslim got out and examined the man. He called to his wife: "He's been badly bashed." The wife, dressed in full burga, left the car and helped her husband to make the man more comfortable. Then she got a water bottle and with some tissues, she gently mopped the blood. Meanwhile her husband was on his mobile ringing for an ambulance and the police.

"The victim had partially recovered consciousness and the couple spoke softly to him, assuring him that help was coming. The ambulance arrived and soon the man was on his way to hospital, followed by the Muslim couple. In Casualty, the man was in and out of consciousness. The couple stayed with him, holding his hand and comforting him. Finally, the doctor in attendance told them that the man would remain in hospital over night and there was nothing more they could do for him. So they left him \$50 dollars in case the police were not able to track down his relatives. The next day they visited the injured man in Intensive Care and brought him some clothes and toiletries. "Which of these people, do you think, proved themselves neighbour to the man who was bashed?" The lawyer paused, looking uncomfortable. "The couple who helped him," he replied at last. Jesus said to him, "You mean, the Muslim couple?" "Yes" Jesus said to him, "On your way, and do the same yourself." At the time of Jesus, the Jews despised and hated the Samaritans. Two thousand years later, we have similar problems based on colour, language and religion. The problem is made worse because of the war in Iraq and in Afghanistan. You will always have extremists but the vast majority of people are decent, law-abiding citizens, who want only the opportunity to live and bring up their family in peace and security. Let us listen to Jesus as he says to each one of us, "Go, and do the same yourself."

THOUGHTS ON THE GOSPEL

In today's Gospel we hear one of the most powerful of Jesus' parables. As the man lies half dead on the road a priest and a Levite pass by on the other side. Perhaps they are afraid of touching a half-dead man and infringing laws of purity.

It is the Samaritan who shows the truly human reaction to this stricken man, caring for his wounds and transporting him to a place of safety and rest. Those who represent the Law are given a lesson in how to keep the Law by one who is deemed to be outside it.

The Fathers of the Church saw in the story of the Good Samaritan the pattern of our lives. The stricken man is an image of our own fallen nature; bowed down and bleeding, unable to raise ourselves from the dust. The priest and the Levite are our disfigured hearts; our inability to reach out in compassion to heal and carry others. It is Jesus Christ who enters this world in mercy and love to bring healing and to carry us to his Father; healing our wounds through his precious blood, and lifting us to the Father in his resurrection.
